

What and Why is Behbud?

- Behbud Association of Pakistan is a non-Government, non- profit, non- politicalorganization working for the support and strength for women in order to empower them through direct investment in the total socio-economic development of marginalized Communities living in densely populated urban slums and various rural areas via vocational training programs, regardless of color, caste or creed.
- Founded by Mrs. Akhar Riazuddin in 1967 on the principle that women are the most vulnerable and therefore need programs and initiatives to support them in building skills to generate income that helps them to alleviate poverty.
- The activities are supervised by an elected Executive Committee consisting of a group of ladies who work entirely on volunteer basis.
- Activities are run at Behbud's premises, the Rawalpindi Head Office; The Saidpur Complex in the picturesque Saidpur Village in Islamabad; The Behbud Boutique and Café Behbud in the Super Market, F-6, Islamabad; Behbud's High School in Satellite Town, Rawalpindi and 5 Home Schools in the urban slums of Rawalpindi.
- Behbud Association of Pakistan is registered with National Council of Social Welfare, Government of Pakistan as well as under the Voluntary Social Welfare Agencies (Registration and Control) Ordinance 1961 Act, Government of Punjab.
- It enjoys tax exemption under clause (36) of section 2 of the Income Tax Ordinance 2001.
- Behbud has a presence in every Province, founded over the years: Karachi in 1970, Lahore- 1971, Islamabad- 1972, Peshawar-1981, Quetta-1984, Multan-1986, and Gujranwala-1987. A Behbud Chapter was opened in New York, USA in July 2008.







The Industrial Vocational Center in Rawalpindi housed at Behbud Headquarters is the largest in Pakistan. It has trained more than a 100,000 Home Based Women Workers (HBWW) spanning four generations. It trains these women and then employs them giving them wages according to their load of work, which in turn generates income for them and uplifts them financially, resulting in greater self esteem, and a profession in hand which can sustain them for life.

Behbud products of household linens and women and children's dresses are by now well known all over urban Pakistan. They are produced in the Industrial Home which form the core concept of Behbud and provides opportunity to our women workers to earn a supplemental income for their families thus gaining Self Respect and Self Reliance. There has been a tremendous growth in the production unit, Rawalpindi year after year, all because of Mrs. Abida Malik, Vice-President, Behbud and Incharge of the Industrial Home, and her team.

Sales were up by 44% in 2009-2010, as compared to the earlier year. By the grace of God, not only did we achieve our target of seventy lakh ruppees, (Rs.70,00,000), but actually went well beyond that.

Home Based Workers are paid wages or are paid per piece/item sown. These payments amounted to Rs. 26,02,637/- for the year, while the salaries for all-women Industrial Home Staff amounted to Rs. 11,19,306. This is an example of the objectives of Behbud, which is laying stress on women empowerment rather than on making profit.

Consequently, sales from Behbud Boutique went up tremendously. Credit goes to Boutique Administration and Staff who kept the work going even through the renovations and managed it so well that we did not have to close it down completely at any occasion. Boutique and its Cafe have now become a lively place and the talk of the town.

Five new skill centers have been opened up around Islamabad, at Sihala, Dhok Mahi, Marwat, Dhok Kaley Khan and Altaf Town, targeting about five hundred women at each center.

Many organizations have approached Behbud to become Trainers in the field of Skill Development. It is good news and an indicator of the reputation of Behbud.

Summer Production brought new fashions. Most of the credit for this goes to Mrs. Surraiya Mateen and Mrs. Farrukh Ahmed who brought in the most beautiful designs from different parts of the world.

Exhibition of our products were held in Karachi and Lahore. Both were very successful, hence we have shops for Karachi and Lahore. We have also rented a shop in the Arts and Craft Village in Shakarparian. Initially the sales have been slow. We hope that sales will pick up soon.

The Behbud Boutique, situated in Super Market, F-6, the busy commercial centre of Islamabad is the show-case of BEHBUD, the outlet for displaying and selling the beautiful embroidery and products crafted and created by the skilled women workers at our Centres. The proceeds from the sales benefit the Home-Based Women Workers, support existing programs and help in funding the opening of more such centers in other areas.

Last year an entire new look was given to the shop. Architect Shama Usman has renovated the premises on volountary basis, while Saeeda Mehmood with the help of her Committee has done the interior decor.

Because of the new designs, the Kaftans, dresses and Trousers and the new look of the shop, sales have gone up to around Rs. 6 lac daily. The yearly sales were Rs. 62 lacs out of which Rs. 42 lac generated by Industrial Home and Rs. 3.75 by Saidpur.



Basic health care services are provided at the Head office in Rawalpindi. The services offered are:

Dr. Surraya Wajahat Latif Free General Practice is conducted six days a week by qualified doctors. When required, diagnosis are carried out with the help of lab and radiological facilities within the premises. Total number of patients attending the clinic were 9,973 in 2010 as compared

to 9,306 in 2009 and 5,392 in 2001.

- Special clinics in diabetes and hypertension are held every Tuesday. Dr. Shaukat Malik, the renowned physician of Islamabad gives his precious time to the clinic on an honorary basis. Total number attending these clinics was 3,030 as compared to 2,742 last year.
- A Family Planning clinic is working in collaboration with the Government of Pakistan which provides family





planning measures including tubal ligation and vasectomies. This has been possible through the successful efforts of Mrs. Zarmina Khan. A motivator has also been appointed recently to address men and women in the reproductive age group.

- **Diagnostic facilities** include laboratory services and ultrasound. Lab tests are carried out on the state of the art equipments at very nominal charges. Quality assurance and other aspects of the laboratory are looked after by Dr. Surriya Latif, a senior Histopathologist from Islamabad.
- **Ultrasound Patients** are now currently registered at about 2,000 annually, while Lab Patients are approximately 3,000 per annum.
- Mental Health Clinic: According to estimates 13% of the total population of Pakistan suffers from mild to moderate psychiatric morbidity. Behbud workers found persons with emotional problems in the communities, which they serve. Realizing the need to address these issues Mrs. Akhtar Riazuddin agreed to set up a mental health clinic in February 2007 which is providing treatment to more than 2,090 patients and approximately 4,218 patients benefited by counseling. 1,547 (74%)










- The Dental Clinic provides dental care at a nominal rate. This clinic is also run by a qualified dentist.
- Rural Health care programme is conducted on **Mobile**Units. The visiting doctor also provides awareness about the value of clean water and healthy living. Besides giving free medicine, Behbud plans to provide them with water purifying tablets in order to control diseases like diarrhea and hepatitis. Scabies a very common skin condition has been treated aggressively by medicines and awareness of improving personal hygiene has helped to reduce the incidence of scabies by 50%.
- At Saidpur village a clinic run by qualified doctors provides basic health care to the local population at their door step.

BAP, runs 6 schools in the Rawalpindi area, which are the Behbud Model School in Satellite Town Rawalpindi, and five Home Schools located in the urban slums of Rawalpindi.

The Behbud Model School

Located in urban Rawalpindi, Satellite Town has catered to the lower middle class of the surrounding area since 1972.

Currently there are 170 students. It is co-ed up to 5th class (Primary level), and the girl students attend classes up to Matriculation. The staff is monitored by the Behbud Education Committee, which consists of a team of dedicated volunteers from within the Behbud membership, who are or have been professional educators.

Improvements and additions have been a Computer Lab, Science Lab,
 Library, Art and Crafts room. Salaries of the teachers, and



administrative staff were increased. Bonuses for retention and incentive purposes were given to the teachers at the end of the year.

- The school has recently been painted, the furniture refurbished and polished, the outdoor play areas renovated, toilets repaired and a general cleaning of the stores was conducted. The boundry wall, as per the government instructions, was raised to the required level of security.
- Computer classes were started in April 2010 with 9 computers. Later a donation of 10 more computers was received from the 'Umeed' organization.
- A library has been set up for the students, and more books are being obtained. Some books and other needed library equipment could be provided through contributions from well-wishers of Behbud.
- Teacher training is emphasized. Sajida Wasti, Tahira Sheikh and Saadia Mufti have conducted teacher training sessions to better equip our teachers with the knowledge of how to help students achieve their utmost potential. Behbud Model School is supervised by them and are doing an exceptional service.
- The annual budget for 2011-2012 for the schools is as follows:

Behbud Model School: Rs. 21 lakhs

5 Home Schools: Rs. 15 lakhs (expected to increase)

Behbud USA funds the 5 home schools entirely.

The Behbud Model School is funded by Behbud Rawalpindi, local donations and supplemented by Behbud USA to a large extent.

Until three years ago, the school was at the point of closing down because of lack of funds. However thanks to the Education Working Committee and Mrs. Tahira Piracha's help by way of getting donations from abroad (Behbud USA), a new life has been given to this school. Fees are nominal, charged only for the reason that parents take the school seriously. The school follows the Punjab Text Board curriculum, which helps the students in going to a public government school beyond 5th class.

The children come from the poorest of the poor, most vulnerable communities. Many of these children have no prospect for any education and are found collecting recyclables from the trash. Behbud is committed to better the lives of the underprivileged, and thus has brought the right to education at the doorsteps of these children, both girls and boys, helping to take them off the streets and into a learning atmosphere. The Punjab Text Board curriculum is followed in all the Home Schools.

Behbud encourages hiring of teachers of the Home Schools from within the local communities, who have cleared Matriculation, or F.A. exams as the minimum requirement. Salaries of the

teachers were increased by a small percentage at first in 2009 and now in 2012 they are at par with similar schools. Teacher training and refresher courses are conducted throughout the year for the staff to raise the level of their teaching abilities.

With funds from Behbud, USA, all the 5 Home Schools were painted, toilets fixed and clean drinking water provided. Textbooks, notebooks, dictionaries, stationary, art material, and other relevant material was given to each student and replenished as needed. Blackboards, floor matting, and uniforms, were provided; salaries of the teachers were increased and end of the year bonuses were given to all the teachers.

The children were made aware of all the happenings in the world. Rehmatabad School observed the "World Water Day", "Earth day", "World Population Day", "clean hands save lives" all with the assistance of NGO "Paidar". A training session was conducted concerning recycling and the efficient use of paper.





Behbud, USA funds the Home Schools. Hence they require regular progress reports and updates as they are accountable to their donors. The need is therefore felt for a hired Administrator or a committed volunteer to oversee the 5 schools, to promote the academic levels, as volunteers are not readily available all the time.

Behbud and Advocacy




The "Behbud-KAS" (Konrad Adenauer Stiftung) Advocacy Project has been working for the last two years create awareness among underprivileged women. Our main focus has been on health and legal issues. Dr. Fawzia Zaman and Advocate Shaheena Akbar have been engaged by the Project to go to the community and talk to women and answer their queries about common diseases and legal problems they confront in their everyday lives. This year over 5,000 women have benefited from such lectures. Their response has been very encouraging and lectures are often arranged on particular subjects requested by them. To improve knowledge about preventive health measures, the Behbud-KAS Project also organized a Hepatitis Vaccination drive for a community in Bara Kahu, on the outskirts of Islamabad.


Three workshops were also organized for Councilors, social workers, teachers, lady health visitors and politically active women from the community to help them to develop their skills and become agents of change in their own spheres of influence. We hope that workshops of this kind will enable them to play a more constructive and positive role in the political and development process

In addition to lectures over 29 workshops were also conducted during 2010 to train women in a variety of skills that would help them to supplement their incomes. 784 women from different communities in Rawalpindi and Islamabad participated in these short training courses and a large percentage among them have already begun working.

On the 16th of November, 2009 a conference on "The issues of Development and Civil Society" was organized in Islamabad. The papers read during the Conference and the recommendations that emerged on the issues have been published in Book form.

The Saidpur Complex situated in the picturesque Saidpur village of Islamabad continues with its Projects successfully, which are:-

The Behbud Primary School:- headed by Miss. Jamila. It is so popular in the village that we cannot accommodate all the applications due to acute shortage of space. Currently we have an enrollment of 350 children. It is run on sponsorships and donations. However we have been able to raise the salaries of the teachers and staff. With the help of CDA we have been able to develop a playground for the children.

Computer Classes:- We have recently started these classes, and is successfully run by Miss. Humaira. Recently the Embassy of Norway gave a donation of computers. A Computer Lab has been set up with their help, and classes have started.

Industrial Home:- A very popular project which produces both linen and classic items. Mrs. Raana Saeed and her group supervise the work very efficiently. All items are sold at the Behbud Boutique.

The embroidery and crochet section of Saidpur is supervised by a group of dedicated volunteers, who meet once every two weeks in the Behbud Saidpur Centre to meet a group of community-based women workers. The fabrics, threads and colour schemes are chosen by the volounteers who hand them out to the women workers. After two weeks the work is brought back, checked and wages given immediately. The items are time-tested and have become classic Behbud designs. And so this famous Behbud handicraft goes

Smocked frocks have been in great demand, and we are constantly trying to increase production. They are being made by Mrs. Nayyer who is now being helped by Mrs. Nadia Mir. For Eid we make children's wear, which are sold out as soon as they hit the racks of the Boutique. Knitted children wear is also sold throughout the year.

Dispensary:- This is a facility for the poor, and voluntary doctors come to check the patients and provide free medicines.

A new introduction in the volunteer doctors is Dr. Shahzadi Jogezai, who comes with her team of Lady Health Visitors and providess family planning advice as well as follow-up. The whole village comes alive on these visits.


Masala Project:- This is a modest scheme for grinding, packing and marketing of spices in hygienic conditions. It provides employment for the women of Saidpur Village.

The Behbud Boutique, located in F-6 Supermarket, serves as the outlet for sale of all craft items made by the women trained by Behbud. Other Behbud stalls were those of Education and Health, which presented information on



the schools and health care that the organization funds and supports. KAS (Konrad-Adenauer-Stiftung) stall, which partners with Behbud, displayed items that the women had learnt in their vocational classes for income generation. The Jumbo Sale stall was popular as ever and did brisk business. Café Behbud was one of the most visited stall by the huge crowds and was constantly busy. It was jointly manned by the Café Behbud and the Saidpur Village members and staff. The Entrance gate tickets sale was superbly and valiantly managed by members.

After taking into account the sale of Raffle Tickets, Auction of a gold jewelry set donated by Patiala Jewelers of Rawalpindi, Stall Rentals, Sale of items from all Behbud stalls including Café Behbud, and Sponsorships, Behbud's net income was 17 lacs plus after expenses. The income generated will support Behbud's welfare projects.

Behbud's Finances



The consolidated income of Behbud Association, Head Office, Rawalpindi for the year 2009-2010, was Rs.21.9i9,500/- generated from the following sources:

- Membership subscription, Rs. 25,500.
- Donations from members and the general public, Rs. 2,191,820/-

■ Profit on investments and miscellaneous income, Rs. 9,832,822/-

- Income from health clinics and camps, including ultra sound and dental clinic, Rs.550,176.
- Savings from the Projects, including the Industrial hall, Boutique, Saidpur and the Education project, Rs. 9,319,181/-. (Contribution of the Industrial Hall amounts to 98%).

The above amount was spent on health care, medicines, jahez, relief for the IDPs of Swat, charities and donations. This amounted to Rs. 2,070,982/-

Administration costs to run the projects was Rs. 2,616,829/-

The final result was a savings of Rs. 17,231,688/-. It shows that with the commitment of its volunteer Members humanitarian and welfare ventures can be pursued without compromising the sustainability of the Organization. It is a longterm commitment to this cause. The Members hardly use any facility of the Behbud office, catering for their own teas during the meetings, and even doing without the air-conditioning and heating to save on Behbud's electricity bills!

Fund Raising: The main fund-raising event of Behbud was its annual Meena Bazaar, However, for the last seven years this could not be held because of the law and order situation in the country. Hence under the leadership of Tahira Piracha we resorted to single fund-raising efforts, organizing small functions in people's houses. This has also helped to remind people of our active presence. A notable event by way of fund raising was the dance performance by Sheema Kirmani and her team in the Islamabad Club Auditorium. We raised more than Rs. 11 lakhs in this one event only.

A big achievement of Behbud is that it has entered into the global world. With the sole efforts of our Member, Mrs. Tahira Piracha, a US Chapter was opened in July 2008. It is "Behbud Association USA, Inc." (Behbud USA) established as a 501(c) (3) non-profit, tax exempt organization, and incorporated in the state of Connecticut, with branches in New York, New Jersey and California.

The Mission is to raise funds for Behbud's projects in the Rawalpindi-Islamabad area for Education, Health, and Vocational Training for women and generally for Women Economic Empowerment. Members of the Behbud Committee are all volunteers who work tirelessly.

In addition to financing 5 Home Schools and supplementing the Behbud Model School, Rawalpindi, Behbud, USA supports one women vocational training centre which helps around 200 women, Café Behbud, and Health care projects.



In fulfillment of one of its main objectives, that of assistance in rehabilitation of victims of a calamity, Behbud rose to the occasion in the case of the worst floods in Pakistani history in 2010, which affected the lives of an estimated 18 million people, i.e. one in every 8 Pakistanis. About 1.3 million people were rescued, but around 1.8 million homes were damaged or destroyed. Behbud Rawalpindi Head office and its branches played their roles in the enormous task of restoring damaged homes and infrastructure, and provided shelter, food, water and healthcare to as many affectees as possible.

The Rawalpindi centre dispatched relief goods worth Rs. 4,999,738, consisting of dry rations, hand fans, coolers, crockery, shoes, medicines, beddings, stitched clothes, sweaters, socks and cash for their rents, etc.

Houses worth Rs. 3,740,000 were built in collaboration with the National Rural Support Programme, (34 houses @ Rs. 110,000/-each) 22 houses were constructed from donations of Behbud USA. All this was possible because of the generous donations and work done by the members of the Executive.



In Multan, the Centre adopted 200 families in the Layyah area and 277 families in D. I.Khan and Muzaffargarh. Their houses were rebuilt and they were provided with all the essential items. Clothes, shoes and gifts were given to 3,360 persons, men, women and children in the same two areas, in addition to setting up medical camps.

The Lahore Centre distributed food and medicines worth Rs. 3,260,880 in their first phase of flood relief activities. They joined a network of 14 NGOs working together in Kot Addu. Their target is 5,660 families. Now they are in their second phase of settling them in their homes which are almost complete.

Karachi Centre raised an amount of Rs. 2,208,610/-which was spent on sending rations, clothes and medicines. In collaboration with "Off Road Pakistan" and "70th GDP Group", the Centre has reached out to vaccination of livestock, provision of fodder and of tents. Later they installed water pumps in one of the villages near Kotri.





Karachi Chapter Focus on Skill Development

Working for female empowerment for the last 40 years, this centre reaches out to 208,548 beneficiaries directly, and 1,149,885 indirectly.

The Behbud Education System provides quality education to the children of katchi abadis in 3 secondary and 5 primary schools. There are 4 community schools and 3 literacy centres working in 6 shifts. There is also a computer Lab working on 5 shifts daily and a Learning Resource Centre, which conducts teacher training courses.

Behbud Health Services covers all aspects of health care for the family. 36 clinics are run every week in the Mehmoodabad and Shirin Jinnah centres.

Vocational Training for income generation is provided to both men and women. Classes are held for leather craft, block printing, computers, electrician work, motor rewinding, sewing/cutting and embroidery in all the three centres in Mehmoodabad, Shirin Jinnah and Korangi.

Lahore — Expansion of the Behbud Complex

As the Lahore Centre enters its 30th year of existence, it has much to show. During the last year, it has expanded its structure by adding an upper story to be used for the Industrial Home with donations from supporters. With added infrastructure, an ambitious medical centre has been set up. Facilities include a 40-bed convalescent home for women and children, affiliated with Mayo, Services, Fatima Memorial and Ganga Ram Hospitals. There is an Arthiritis/Rheumatology clinic, (Diagnostic and Treatment Clinic), Digital X-ray unit, Ultrasonography, Physiotherepy and Rehabilitation Centre, Clinical Laboratory, Outreach Health Centres at Shams Qari, Ghousia Colony and Islampura and the Nasirabad Health Centre.

The Centre runs its own schools, a High School for Girls and a Primary school at Shahdara. This is in addition to stipends to 34 students studying in professional colleges to cover their entire period of study, 4/5 years. Then there are adult literacy classes and cooking classes for women, a typing school and computer classes at Naseerabad, while Holy Quran and 'Daras' classes are held at the main centre.

As in the other centres, the main feature is the Industrial Home, set up for income-generation projects. It consists of a linen section, sewing, frock, knitting and kurta-dupatta sections. A 'Thrift Shop' is running successfully. Second handclothes and crockery, etc. are sold here. Training courses in Beauty Parlor activities is imparted. Welfare Projects include a 'Jehaz' Bank and charity to families in distress.

Multan – Focus on Healthcare
